And lo and behold, our own Steve Barclay has some good news from a friend of the show, David Grimes that we're going to share it with the audience as well as discuss a few other topics that we came across this week. All right. So do you want to maybe start with ... well pick a story? Well, let's let's start with David. Because I mean, this is this is a just a great story, I think. So we had Dr. David Grimes on the show a while back to talk about the work that he does with Medical Ministries International. So David is a member of project and I'm on the Children's Low Vision Project of British Columbia. He's one of our two optometrists and every now and then he goes wanders to some far flung part of the world and help helps with these vision clinics. So most recently, he was in I'm gonna say this wrong Cienega de Oro in Columbia. And he sent this letter to all of

the CLVP folks because we had given him a bunch of old magnifiers and stuff to take with them

on this trip. So here's here's what he had to say. He said "the picture below is of Diego, one of our last patients of the day at the clinic he needed new glasses badly his old ones were scratched, not even close to his correct prescription. We refracted him and found an almost perfect match for his for his prescription. He was ecstatic. He said he was a jewelry jeweler and worked with fine silver threads and the new glass would make a world of difference for him. Somebody said we should send him to Dave, doesn't he have some of those us magnifiers with them? I started showing them various domes line magnifiers pocket magnifiers and he settled on one of the saddest ones in the collection scratched broken light, no cover, but it was a perfect size and wait for him. I told him it was a gift from a student back home in Canada and he wanted me to send a picture of him using it. He was beaming. Apparently the second picture below is of a rosary he made for Pope Francis. The original is in Rome with the Pope. And he still has a replica here in Colombia. I admit I was pretty skeptical, but the translators and a quick Google search confirmed every word. So somewhere in BC, one of our students donated a magnifier that's now in the hands of the Pope's jeweler." Wow.

Yeah. And he said a picture of the jewelry that the guy created. It's gorgeous. It's absolutely stunning. So yeah, so donated magnifier, you just never know who it's going to help out. In this case. It helped with the Pope's jeweler, go figure. And then the next day, he said another one for a 85 year old. He loved a little easy Pocket Magnifier. He was blind in one eye 2200 and the other from AMD macular degeneration and glaucoma. And he's now able to read using that little handheld magnifier. So fantastic. Of the first week of that clinic, they saw 1800 patients, and they removed 70 cataracts.

Wow. Yeah. And so if people had used products like that, are you accepting donations? Absolutely. So look, he can use, he can use glasses, he can use magnifiers even even if the you know if the glasses are, are scratched up, whatever. It doesn't matter if the magnifiers you know, maybe they worked off battery once but don't anymore. As long as they actually have, you know, the ability to magnify stuff. He can use these things. And yeah, anybody who, if you if you gather stuff up if you want to get it to Dave, just let me know. Because Peter Dinklage made made some comment about, you know, being a little put out by the idea of this project and He said that he found a bit of a discrepancy at the progressive casting as a Latina actress as Snow White, and then go backwards story about seven dwarves living in a cave together. So Disney responded to that and said that was their statement to to avoid reinforcing stereotypes from the original animated film, we are taking a different approach with these seven characters and have been consulting with members of the dwarfism community. We look forward to sharing more as the film heads into production after a lengthy development period. So yeah, I don't I don't know. I'm sort of I guess I'm sort of hung up on this one. I'm not really sure how to feel about it. I mean, if they're consulting with the dwarfism community, and it's cool with them, then I figure great, right? Well, that's what we're always asking for. Right is to be involved in the discussions and here we are. We're being involved in the discussions and still upsetting people. Well, that's you know, that's that's like the the blindness community right? Every everybody thinks blindness community thinks it's one big community. And it's not it's, it's a bunch of, it's a whole bunch of people with different opinions. Go figure.

So he there is some poking fun of that whole concept. And sometimes I think that people think that you can't be a member of a marginalized group, but still have a sense of humor when things are just done in a in a funny way. And so I think it is interesting that he was quoted as saying that, you know, being portrayed as you know, these dwarves living in a cave, I mean, do we even has the storyline even come out that he, we even know that that's what happens in the movie?

In a in a cartoon, versus how do we take a story from years past a classic, and modernize it to make it more reflective for audiences today?

But just by the name. The story was about a Hispanic, you know, Latino family. And it was cast with all non Hispanic actors such Angelica Houston was in it. And Marissa Tormei and some others that I just can't think of off the top of my head. And there was a lot of outrage for what you know as to why are using very obviously Caucasian actors to play Hispanic parts. And there are tons and tons of Hispanic actors who are more than qualified to do this. And there was such you know, such outrage over that. And now here we have something where they're trying to be inclusive, and more open minded. And then there's still backlash on the from the other end. So it's like you're damned if you do you're damned if you don't,

Like there's definitely yes, some stories that should no longer be told? There's definitely things that need to change. But are we just getting a little too sensitive? Well, this is one of those conversations where as a white guy I just sort of walk away from am I getting too sensitive? Probably not. Probably not, you know, I should probably be more sensitive. But yeah, I don't know that. You're never gonna keep everybody happy. But, you know, at least we can have conversations around it, whether it gets us anywhere. Who knows?

I think the the idea came up two weeks ago, in the conversation with, with Amy and Shawn, that, you know, representation does matter. I think that was one of the things that was sort of stirred up in our huge mishmash of, of pornographic conversation. inspiration porn, I'm sorry, for anyone who who didn't catch it. That's the that's really what we talked about. There's plenty of representation in real pornography too, by the way. So but the point being is that yes, representation does certainly matter. And so I can't see how it's ever going to be a bad thing. By having younger people see characters who look like them doesn't have to be every character, but at least at least some. And when we think about who's really the audience for Peter Pan and Sleeping Beauty, it's certainly not us, at least. It's not our demo. I mean, it's this younger group that probably needs to have that that diversity that we lacked right in our childhoods.

All right. Next one up was a robot guide called Pepper could help the blind and partially sighted people. Let me tell us about pepper. Okay, so Pepper was developed by students and staff at the University of Glasgow. And it's a robotic guide to lead people around. And one of the one of the things that they pointed out is, when people are using a white cane, you're tapping around, you're looking for stuff, you find stuff by hitting it with a white cane. And in their parking lot, at the university, I guess they'd had people get sort of uppity about having your cars thwacked with canes or something. So I thought, Hmm, well, maybe we can come up with a guide that'll that'll lead people around and identify objects and stuff and you know, not actually have to run into things. So they have a humanoid shaped guide that you can you can follow around with and this was done in conjunction with the RNIB the Royal National Institute for the Blind in Scotland. And yeah, so we've got this Pepper .. is humanoid shape robot, which is probably about in the in the picture that I see it comes up to about the guy's sternum. And, you know, because it's humanoid, you can, you know, put a hand on a shoulder or whatever, and it can, it can lead you around places. So it's interesting. It's an interesting idea. When I look at the the pictures of it, it's got it's got wheels on the bottom that don't look like they are really built for off roading in any sense. There's, yeah, it looks like it would be a pretty level. Sort of, you know, it's gotta be on the level by the looks of it. I don't I don't know how it's gonna go up and down stairs and stuff. Or over curb for that matter.

have have been basing it off a guide dog this route, rather than guiding, you know, designing off of the idea of being a person. So interesting.

It's got sort of round shapes towards where the IRS would be. I don't know what those are either. This article doesn't get into a lot of that. Then it's got a torso with a big screen on the front of it, but it looks of it. Two arms. The legs are joined together and go down to some sort of wheel assembly. Which looks a little disturbingly like testicles on the ground. Now that I look at it but yeah, that's probably my association.

Okay, that makes more sense of what I was thinking. I figured you got in the stall and went hey dude, nice chunk you know.

I think that for the restroom, maybe on the man side male side if it isn't a gender neutral one, but if there is a gender specific maybe when you miss you get a little warning. A little higher....

That's right. You know, we're always asking for more audio description. And here we are. Right. Yeah. Certain things we don't need.

Lis Malone 27:32

I think I think some of the some of the sighted clientele could benefit from a little go left. Go left, no, no, no. Okay. Nope. Don't cross the streams. Nope, nope, nope. I think there's just been a lot of I just sometimes when you're in those public bathrooms, you're like, how could you have gone so terribly wrong? Oh, it's pretty. It's to me, it seems a little cut and dry little, you know, ABC, but for some reason, I just don't know why. So maybe that there is a dual benefit to another one of those. Like, we're talking about how the sighted community benefits from things from the low vision community.

Ryan Fleury 28:10

Yes, I think if it's not your bathroom, nobody cares. Right? So you walk in you take your chances.

Lis Malone 28:18

Now where was this the audio described talking bathroom?

Ryan Fleury 28:22

It's in the UK. It just says served by Northern so I assume that's northern rail, which I I don't know. Or the northern part of the EU. And it was in Scotland a bunch of different stations too. So yeah. 44 stations. Okay, interesting. Do a little bit more digging now you can go into one of those stations go into the bathroom and when you get up it'll tell you if you need more fiber. Oh, gosh.

I do think that the the Auto Flush is a is a pro and a con. I think it's a pro you know some of these new features that they have and all the bathrooms. I think it's great because you do have those people who just don't fly but don't flush. Yeah, and that's just gross. Awful. But then you ever get I don't know I think maybe women we get it worse because we don't have we don't have the urinals. But sometimes it just starts to flush before you're not even anywhere near ready. And it ends up splashing your rear.

You know, especially because you work in this space, Steve, I think all this stuff is is amazing. But you have people who can't even afford to buy, you know, fuel efficient cars. I mean, how is anyone ever going to be able to afford something like Pepper? Who's going to pay? Who could ever pay for something like that?
- Well, it's a good question. Because, yeah, certainly technology like that is going to be expensive. But when you compare it, if you can, if you can scale it up and bring it to production and put it out in the world, can you scale it to the point where it becomes cost competitive with a guide dog, because that's sort of the space that they seem to be targeting with this, right. So in order for that to happen, you know, you've got to have something that is going to, you know, one hopefully lasts longer than the guide dog does, because the guide dog is typically only good for, you know, maybe at most 810 years for for service time. And then you got to go, you know, get another guide dog, which somebody has spent a lot of time training. And you have to feed that animal through its entire life and take it outside and water it. You don't have to feed this, you don't have to water it. You don't have to train it. So none of those costs exist. So can it

be competitive? Cost wise, maybe eventually. But is it going to be as functional? I guess that remains to be seen. I think there's so many unemployed people out there that the government needs to start matching people up. Anybody who wants to go get a guide in the government

pays their wages. Oh, can you imagine though not being able to pick it up? This is Frank. Frank has substance issues, take him home with you. He'll lead you around. Know the screening that has to be done. Please have screening.

Lis Malone 32:20

Where do you keep Steve's like, I'm going to take that Asian woman in the pantyhose commercial that Lis was talking about. I want her to be my guide. Well, I just thought you know that that is one of the things that is always the The x factor in any of these new developments is just how do we how do we bring it to market?

Ryan Fleury 32:46

You know, we've talked away, something we've talked about over and over again, is you know, so many people are trying to replace, you know, the white cane and the dog with you know, haptic canes, laser canes, robot dogs, now humanoid robots. You know, a lot of us will still go back to the tried and true, right.

Lis Malone 33:06

I thought it was interesting, because there was a quote in that article about the robot guide that the I don't remember who said it, but she had, I believe it was a she had said something to the effect of that, that there's no respect for the white cane out there. I was like, wow, what's going on in Scotland? Like there's like some serious hostility there where they were talking about violent confrontations with people in the parking lot. Like you mentioned, Steve, that, that it was that people are getting upset. I'm like, Wow, I'm like, gosh, as, as a person who's a cane user, I have never had a confrontation with somebody that was aggressive.

Ryan Fleury 33:47

When I don't know if you remember Steve, but when the colored canes came out, I started carrying those. There was a bit of a conversation there as well, because people identify the white cane as someone who's blind or partially sighted. And now they're walking around with pink canes, yellow canes, orange canes, black canes, blue canes, green canes, those don't mean anything to anybody. And there was, I think, a pretty big conversation about should we stick with a white cane? Or does it matter? Yeah. And, you know, it was funny, because when that happened, that was Ambutech, who first started offering - well, I don't know if they were the first to start offering different colors, but they could they could do okay in in pretty much any color you wanted. And, you know, we had people contacting us because they wanted a cane that went with, you know, their outfit. Yeah, no, no, I have a purple dress, I want to wear it. You know, I want to have a purple cane. You know, I don't want my white caning. It's my purple dress when I'm going to a fancy fancy thing. So you know, they wanted to just simply color coordinate. And, you know, honestly, the, the cane itself. It's pretty distinctive. Like there's nobody walking around with hands like that, yeah, who don't have vision impairments

unless they're just, you know, some weirdo is gonna whack you on the street or something. But so I don't I don't really see what the color issue was so much, because we still run into people who don't know what the white cane is.

Lis Malone 35:19

Are these colored canes as reflective?

Ryan Fleury 35:23

Yeah, they were they were all reflective. Yeah. Yeah, reflective wraps.

Lis Malone 35:29

But do you think that if you have like a blue, black, purple, whatever, cane, and you're not actively engaged in motion? And, you know, doing the sweep with somebody, maybe not recognize that right away? Because, like you said, there are people who don't recognize the white cane, and then there are people who need a second like, Wait, oh, gosh, yeah, that, you know, white with the with the red striping, is very symbolic. So are we then, you know, adding another unnecessary layer for the sake of vanity, but not necessarily for the sake of, you know, important functionality in making sure that those around us are aware of our specific situation?

Ryan Fleury 36:19

Yeah, I mean, that's, that's the counter argument, right. And obviously, some people have chosen to, you know, go the other way and say, I don't, I don't care that it doesn't necessarily identify me in the same way as a white cane does, you know, my color coordination is more important in some schmuck knowing what that cane is.

Lis Malone 36:44
